### **Course Description:**

This class connects us to God's missionary heart by exploring cross-cultural ministry encounters in the Bible and in today's world. After defining the concepts of cultures and sub-cultures, we will study ethnic groups in the Mohawk Valley, with special emphasis on those yet unreached by the Gospel. The class will feature dramatic presentations, guest speakers from various ethnic groups, interactive discussions, and videos.

### **Course Objectives:**

- 1. Fully grasp God's Great Commission plan for every ethnic group—to reach them with the Gospel, make disciples and plant churches among them.
- 2. Nourish the spiritual qualities for impactful cross-cultural ministry.
- 3. Explore the concepts of culture and sub-culture.
- 4. Gain familiarity with various cultures and contexts in the Bible.
- 5. Develop a meta-cultural grid for understanding and evaluating cultures.
- 6. Engage various ethnic groups in the Mohawk Valley through research, prayer and interaction with members of their communities.

Note: Our class will frequently feature speakers from local ethnic groups. Those dates will be communicated later.

# **Requirements:**

- 1. Attend class sessions.
- 2. Read the required texts in their entirety.
- 3. Participate in class discussions and reviews of assigned readings.
- 4. Team Projects: Each student will be assigned to a team that will dramatize various Bible narratives. More details will be given in class.

- 5. Missions Paper: Write a five-page paper on a missions topic of your choice. The topic must be approved by the instructor. Suggested topics will be discussed in class. The paper is due Monday, March 21<sup>st</sup> by 6:30 pm.
- 6. Ethnic Group Research Paper: Write a ten-page paper on a local non-Christian ethnic group. The paper must be based on an interview with a local person from that ethnic group. In this interview, be sure to find out where the person was born, his or her religion, language(s) spoken, holidays celebrated by the ethnic group, where people in the ethnic group live locally, where they worship, what caused him/her to immigrate, and the interviewee's perspective on immigrating to the Mohawk Valley. Conclude with the spiritual needs of the person and his or her ethnic group, and how Jesus uniquely meets those needs. You may use narrative or Question and Answer format. The paper is due Monday, April 18, by 6:30 pm.
- 7. Final Exam: A multiple-choice and short-answer exam will be given the last night of class.

Written papers should be double-spaced in 12 point font, Times New Roman. A title page may be included but will not count toward the total page count. References should be provided according to the Turabian parenthetical format, 8<sup>th</sup> Edition. An example is below. The instructor will expect that material from other authors be referenced, and direct quotes be set off in quotations.

The instructor prefers to receive papers as Word documents sent by email attachment to <u>FredFarrokh@yahoo.com</u>. Typed, hard copy papers will also be accepted.

Late papers will be reduced one letter grade per week late. No papers will be received after April 25, 2016.
